IMPORTANT SEXUAL ASSAULT INFORMATION

Sex crimes:

The New York State Penal law outlines the sexual offenses that can be charged as a crime. A sexual offense occurs when certain sexual acts are perpetrated against a victim without their consent.

Statutory Rape:

A sexual offense defined by the age of the people engaged in sexual activity. When someone over 18 engages in sexual activity with someone under 17 years of age, they are committing a crime since a person less than 17 years of age cannot legally consent to sexual activity. Practically, the greater the age span between the people involved, the more likely police and prosecutors will consider it a crime.

Right to an Advocate:

Survivors have the right to an advocate from a local rape crisis or crime victim organization that can provide crisis intervention, confidential emotional support, and information and advocacy on their behalf. SAFE Hospitals are required to call an advocate when a survivor requests assistance in the Emergency Room.

Medical Examination after an assault:

Survivors of sexual violence are entitled to a free medical exam for physical injuries, Sexually Transmitted Infection (STI) prophylaxis, and/or pregnancy prevention methods as well as for the preservation of evidence by doing a sexual assault forensic examination regardless of immigration status or health insurance.

Survivors Bill of Rights

It provides written information about a survivor's rights in hospital emergency departments, with law enforcement and with District Attorney's offices. It also provides important contact information for the division of the New York Police Department that investigates sex crimes, for the District Attorney's Office and relevant Hotline numbers.

Address Confidentiality Program:

Survivors have the right to a legal substitute address (usually a post office box) to use in place of their physical address to protect them from offenders who may use public records to locate them.

Sexual Harassment:

Employers will be held accountable for addressing all forms of sexual harassment and discrimination in the workplace, and survivors will be given the necessary time to report complaints and seek justice. Managers who observe or are told about acts of sexual harassment must report it to their supervisor under the law.

Report to Law Enforcement:

Survivors have the right to choose whether to report the assault to law enforcement. Survivors can call 911 or the NYPD Special Victims Division's 24-hour hotline, contact a local police precinct or visit a medical center to make a report.

Child Victims Act:

It allows adult survivors of child sexual abuse in New York State to file a report until the age of 55 as well as providing a one-year period (beginning 8.14.19) to file a civil action for damages for childhood survivors of sexual abuse who could not file a lawsuit because of age

Child Pornography:

Cyber-stalking:

The malicious publication or sharing of an intimate image of a person without their consent is a misdemeanor, punishable up to 1 year in jail and a \$1,000 fine. Victim must prove the person who published did so "with the intent to cause harm to the emotional,


Megan's Law:

offenders living in the area. In New York, sex offenders are required to register with the State after conviction, or if they serve time in prison, upon their release, and notify the registry when they relocate. Sex offenders who move to New York from another state also must register.

Mandatory reporting:

Certain medical, school and social service professionals are required to file a report with Child Protective Services when they are presented with a reasonable cause to

suspect child abuse, maltreatment or neglect in a situation where a parent, or another person legally responsible for the child may be the person causing harm.
